A new start...

Kensington Regeneration's partnership with local schools has been one of the outstanding successes of its work in the area over the past eight years.

In fact, the Kensington education programme is widely regarded as an example of regeneration best practice in terms of all 39 New Deal for Communities initiatives in the country.

George Allen, Kensington Regeneration's Lifelong Learning, Employment and Enterprise Manager, explains: "Kensington Regeneration funding has provided children with new learning opportunities, purchased additional equipment and resources, enhanced family learning opportunities and improved school security.

"Working in partnership with the Excite Education Action Zone we've also delivered activities such as breakfast clubs, after-school study and accelerated learning schemes.

"And – very importantly – we've also been able to tackle one of the major problems that the area faced back in 2000 which was that a number of school buildings were run down and no longer fit for purpose. In addition, Kensington lacked a secondary school to which local primary school children could progress."

Eight years on all these issues have been addressed and the benefits of the partnership between Kensington Regeneration and local schools are reflected in the achievements of Kensington's five local primary schools and in the new Academy of St Francis of Assisi.

For example, St Sebastian's Catholic Primary recently received its third successive excellent Ofsted report. Inspectors described it as 'an outstanding school that gives pupils an excellent all-round education'.

This report followed hot on the heels of an Ofsted assessment of Kensington Infants as 'an outstanding school which provides first-rate care and support for all who attend'.

> Just in case this wasn't clear enough the inspectors added: "It is difficult to see what more Kensington Infants School could do for its pupils."

All the primary schools in the area – Phoenix Primary, Sacred Heart Primary and Kensington Juniors as well as St Sebastian's and Kensington Infants – have recorded their bestever SATs results in one or more subjects and the Academy topped a Government league table as the fastest-improving school in the country at GCSE level.

Celebrating Success Kensington Infants

Key achievements and developments at Kensington Infant School have included:

- Continuous improvement in terms of Ofsted reports. Inspectors assessed the school as 'improving', then 'very good' and most recently in 2007 as 'outstanding'.
- The creation of a high-quality outdoor learning environment with the help of funding from Kensington Regeneration. It helps to improve children's health through high-energy play and also encourages curiosity and independence.
- A Family Learning Room with a fully-equipped creche, also funded by Kensington Regeneration. Parents and carers can work with their children, particularly on improving literacy and numeracy skills, and also take courses themselves.
- Year-on-year improvements in Key Stage 1 SATs results since 2005.

Celebrating Success Kensington Juniors

Key achievements and developments at Kensington Junior School have included:

- A continuous upward trend in levels of attainment by pupils throughout the lifetime of the Kensington Regeneration programme.
- Raised levels of competence in information and communication technology skills thanks to Kensington Regeneration's investment in laptops, interactive white boards and digital camcorders.
- Excellent outdoor play facilities also funded by Kensington Regeneration – which have a positive impact on children's behaviour, encouraging co-operation and a sense of belonging.
- Significantly enhanced musical attainment thanks to the Music for Life project with the RLPO which has resulted in the creation of the school orchestra which involves up to 50 children playing together.

Overall attendance in Kensington schools is now 94 per cent – higher than the Liverpool average – and the number of students achieving five or more A* to C grades at GCSE level continues to improve and is now 25 per cent higher than in 2002.

Remarkably, all this has been achieved at a time when Kensington has been undergoing some profound changes, welcoming large numbers of new residents from a wide range of ethnic backgrounds.

Statistics bear this out. Between 1991 and 2001 the BME population had risen from 4.7 per cent to 14.5 per cent. The current figure is estimated to be 22 per cent.

Staff at one school have calculated that 24 languages are now spoken there, while schools like Kensington Juniors have developed an excellent track record – and attracted widespread praise – for the quality of support they provide to children whose first language is not English.

The progress that has been made over the past eight years is remarkable, and reflects the enthusiastic way that schools,

teachers, parents and children have embraced the new opportunities that Kensington Regeneration funding has brought to the area.

New facilities

In terms of new education facilities in the area created with the help of Kensington Regeneration, one of the biggest successes has been the multi-award-winning Academy of St Francis of Assisi which occupies the site of a former council depot on Sheil Road.

Prior to its opening in 2006 Kensington children attended a number of secondary schools across the city, and consultation at the time revealed widespread support for a dedicated facility for the local area.

900 pupils attend the £21-million school in Newsham Park which is the only City Academy in the country which has the environment and sustainability as its specialism.

This theme was incorporated into the design of the building which includes a solar atrium which brings warmth and natural light into the building in winter, and solar shading to prevent overheating in summer.

With the Academy boasting a range of other special features including an east-west school layout (to maximise solar benefits), super-insulated roofs and walls and some roofs covered with sedum plants as a habitat for birds, it's clear that something quite extraordinary has been created for Kensington families.

Pupils have also been closely involved with the 'green' agenda at the Academy, taking the lead on issues such as writing an eco-policy for the school, tackling litter and the recycling of items like printer cartridges and mobile phones.

John Caton, Chair of Kensington Regeneration's Lifelong Learning, Employment and Enterprise Committee, comments: "We're delighted that we were able to work with our partners to create this exciting facility which has attracted national interest. The fact that then Prime Minister Tony Blair performed the official opening ceremony demonstrates the significance of this pioneering school."

Kensington Infant and Junior School was another new facility supported by Kensington Regeneration. The new school

complex – opened by Cherie Booth – replaced a 114-yearold Victorian building that was riddled with dry rot.

Kensington Regeneration funding helped to top up Government and local authority cash by providing a zoned playground area and a new, safe pathway into the school.

The aim was to create a new facility that the Kensington community can be really proud of – an outstanding building where children receive an outstanding education.

The third major new-build project supported by Kensington Regeneration was the Field of Dreams Nursery, arts centre and sports facilities created at St Sebastian's Primary School on Holly Road.

- Organising an annual outdoor activity week with the help of funding from Kensington Regeneration. Widely regarded as the best week of the school year by the Year 6 pupils and staff who attend!
- A very successful drive to improve attendance, including 100 per cent attendance competitions every half term. The overall attendance figure in 2008 was 95.3 per cent - the best ever at the school.
- The Music for Life project which has given pupils the opportunity to learn from world-class musicians.

Key achievements and developments at Phoenix Primary School have included:

- A very positive Ofsted report in January this year which praised 'the concerted effort to raise the quality of teaching and learning which is a major factor in the improving rate of progress made by pupils'.
- Achieving the school's best-ever Key Stage 2 SATs results in English in 2007 and excellent results in maths and science this year.
- Coming second in a competition organised by Radio City for schools across the city which aimed to recognise and reward improved attendance.
- Seeing the school's reception class performing their own 'rap' song on stage at the Philharmonic Hall thanks to the Music for Life project.

This facility – opened by Lord David Puttnam – has provided a first-class environment for children in the Foundation Unit.

Together with the Life Bank it is also providing many Kensington families with high-quality, affordable childcare on their doorstep. Prior to these new developments there were no dedicated nursery facilities in the area.

All five of Kensington's primary schools have also benefited from the introduction of state-of-the-art security features funded by the Kensington Regeneration programme. The high-tech smoke screens and water sprays have virtually wiped out break-ins and vandalism in the schools.

Smoke Cloak is activated when a school's security is breached. Each area where the devices are fitted fills with a dense white fog in seconds, making it impossible for the offenders to see what they are doing, leaving them disorientated.

This is supplemented by a Smart Water spray which is activated when the offenders are in the building, leaving them indelibly marked with a

DNA-like substance which is visible under special lights.

Kensington Juniors Head Bryn Gorry comments: "Break-ins used to be a real problem in the area. They were costing schools an awful lot of money and were really upsetting for both staff and pupils.

"There has been a big reduction in the number of incidents since the introduction of this scheme. It has obviously been a real deterrent to criminals and thus money very well spent."

New learning opportunities and experiences

One of the key aims of Kensington Regeneration's work with schools has been to give children access to new learning opportunities and experiences.

The Music for Life project has been an outstanding example of this aspect of the programme, forging a unique link between the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra and local primary schools.

Children have also been able to get involved with a songwriting project, working with singers, guitarists, rappers and DJs as well as the RLPO musicians.

The project is unique to Kensington – there's nothing like it anywhere else in the country – and there has been a fantastic response from children and staff at the schools and this has resulted in a number of memorable and highlyenjoyable performances.

Everyone who attends these events can see that as well as being a valuable skill in its own right, music has the power to

encourage self expression and build the confidence of children. When you see them performing, it's clear they're getting a huge amount of enjoyment out of playing and singing.

Music for Life is now widely regarded as an example of national best practice and has even attracted Government interest, being the subject of a visit from then Arts and Culture Secretary Tessa Jowell.

Other Kensington Regeneration projects aimed at providing additional opportunities for local children have included Christmas in the Curriculum, a package of support enabling schools to provide additional activities in the run-up to the festive season, traditionally a peak time for absenteeism.

This has helped schools to keep children motivated by organising pantomimes and Christmas shows, theatre and concert trips, special visits to places like Wigan Pier and

In the light of Kensington's changing demographics, this project has also helped schools to focus on the international aspect of Christmas by exploring how the season is celebrated in other cultures, including the home countries of pupils who have relocated to the New Deal area in recent years.

Kensington Regeneration has also funded a pilot scheme through Liverpool Children's University to give local children a taste of life in higher education.

Children attended extra-curricular activity modules after school for a number of weeks each term, building up credits which eventually enabled the pupils to graduate at a highprofile ceremony at one of the leading local universities.

The modules – in subjects like road safety – were designed to raise the children's awareness of opportunities in education while having fun and gaining self confidence at the same time.

Kensington Regeneration's view is that these projects – and similar activities the Partnership has funded on a school-by-school basis – have had really positive results, providing children with new opportunities and experiences in order to broaden their horizons and present them with new challenges.

> Funding from Kensington Regeneration has helped to bring many new resources into Kensington schools in recent years, all aimed at boosting local attendance and attainment levels.

For example, a £75,000 laptop programme provided the five primary schools and the Academy with state-of-the-art ICT equipment. A wide range of hardware and software was purchased, and this was backed up by intensive teaching support.

Other new items included playground equipment, interactive smart boards, art equipment and a pack of educational tools for every pupil in the area.

More recently, there was a substantial investment in family learning projects in the primary schools. At Kensington Juniors this involved families working together on a video project, making short films about life at home and at school using equipment bought with Kensington Regeneration funding.

Phoenix Primary has created a new parents room to provide an in-school base for mums and dads, while St Sebastian's has developed an exciting new outdoor learning environment for pupils, families and community use.

Meanwhile, Sacred Heart Primary has opened a new suite of

Apple Mac computers where parents can work alongside children, and Kensington Infants has opened a parents room and launched a home lending scheme of resources in different languages.

Phoenix Primary Head, Chris Muscatelli, says: "Projects like this are very important because they help to get the message across that learning never stops, whatever your age. They also promote the importance of families learning together, which can result in real benefits for both parents and children."

Kensington Regeneration's most recent schools investment has been via the BLINK – Boosted Learning in Kensington – project, a package of support for activities including shared reading, holiday clubs, help your child with maths schemes and dads and lads clubs.

In addition to these area-wide initiatives Kensington

Regeneration funding has supported a wide range of projects, activities and events in individual schools, ranging from a new parents centre and an initiative to encourage children to drink more milk at Sacred Heart to a new music centre and language lessons at St Sebastian's.

Schools to be proud of

The results of this investment, coupled with the skill and commitment of school staff and the support of parents, can be seen in the comments of Ofsted inspectors, in school attendance figures and in the area's SATs results which continue to improve.

It is also reflected in the individual achievements of the schools. For example, the Academy of St Francis of Assisi is the leading City Academy in the country and the highest-

placed Liverpool school in the Government's CVA - value added - league table.

St Sebastian's Primary – a designated centre of excellence for Spanish – was recently recognised as the best Spanishspeaking school in the country after impressing judges from the London office of the Spanish Ministry for Education.

And Phoenix Primary was also honoured recently in an attendance competition sponsored by Radio City, with the children who had a 100 per cent attendance record being treated to a limousine ride around the city as a prize.

These achievements, and many similar ones in other schools, show how far Kensington Regeneration and Kensington schools have come together.

Kensington Regeneration Chief Executive, Lynn Spencer, believes that it's this partnership approach which has been the key to the progress that has been made over the past eight years.

"Kensington Regeneration and local schools wouldn't have been as successful without each other," she explains. "It's only been achieved through collaboration. We didn't present the schools with a 'scheme' and expect them to fit into it

"From day one we've been meeting with our local schools, listening to their concerns and finding out what form of additional resources and support they felt would help them to operate more effectively.

"We've used these comments to develop projects that were designed to maximise the benefits of Kensington Regeneration funding for pupils, families, staff and Kensington as a whole."

According to Lynn, the Government's SATs results and Ofsted reports reflect these benefits in part, but they don't tell the whole story: "The official figures are obviously very important, but they don't always show how projects like Music for Life and new family learning facilities are changing the lives of children in our area."

The final word goes to Kensington Regeneration's Chair of Lifelong Learning, Employment and Enterprise, John Caton: "Celebrating success is very important, and it's right that we should be looking back with some pride at how far we've come. However, it's also important to remember how far we've still got to go.

"In education, there are always new challenges to be met and new opportunities to be grasped, so we will continue to work closely with the schools throughout the remainder of the Kensington Regeneration programme in order to ensure that the current momentum is maintained, and to support them as they strive for further improvements in the future."



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
