

Community heroes

Kensington has once again been honouring the community heroes who make such a difference to life in the area.

More than 150 guests attended the fifth Kensington Community Awards presentation ceremony, a glittering gala dinner with a horse racing theme held at the Devonshire House Hotel on Edge Lane.

The traditional eight neighbourhood 'Oscars' were up for grabs at the event, plus a special Culture Champion Award marking Liverpool's Capital of Culture year.

The trophies were designed by acclaimed sculptor Stephen Broadbent whose Sheppard Worlock memorial sculpture was unveiled recently on Hope Street in Liverpool city centre.

The event was hosted by corporate entertainer and fundraiser, John Nelson, who summed up the purpose of the awards: "It's an opportunity to celebrate all the positive things that are happening in Kensington and the great people who live in the area.

"So many residents are devoting time and effort to improving the lives of others, including children and young people and the older members of our community.

"The nominations also demonstrate how people are supporting their neighbours when they are most in need - when they are in trouble, sad,

or alone. It all goes to show that Kensington is a community that really cares," he said.

The main award at the event -Kensington's 2008 Resident of the Year - went to Barbara Disley for her tireless work on the Cheviot Road community garden project.

However, age was certainly no barrier to success on the night. Other residents who collected awards ranged from Young Citizen of the Year Sophie Hamlett, who is just 14, through to winners who are the best part of 60 years older!

Kensington Regeneration Chair Norma Williams, who was a guest speaker at the ceremony, commented: "Many kind-hearted people in Kensington are working to improve the lives of other residents and the Community Awards are a great way of recognising and saluting what they do.

"I would like to congratulate everyone who was nominated as well as the winners. They are all a credit to themselves, their families and to Kensington as a whole."

Kensington welcomes VIP guest

One of the country's top civil servants recently made a fact-finding visit to Kensington.

Chris Wormald, Director-General for Local Government and Regeneration in the Communities and Local Government Department, spent a morning in the area before speaking at a major conference at the Liverpool Echo Arena.

Mr Wormald visited a number of projects funded by Kensington Regeneration including the Health Energy and Advice Team, Kensington Community Learning Centre, the Field of Dreams Nursery, Kensington Community Sports Centre and new housing developments in the area.

Kensington Fields celebrates conservation area status

Residents in Kensington Fields travelled back in time recently to celebrate the area being given conservation area status.

A special Victorian Day was organised to mark the achievement which means that the neighbourhood's 1,200 terraced houses are now safe for future generations.

Local people – many of whom were dressed in authentic period costumes – enjoyed attractions

including horse drawn carriage rides, Punch and Judy shows, Victorian games and a delicious Dickensian cream tea.

Community Warden Sue Tracey commented: "We wanted to celebrate the conservation status and what better way to do it than with a historic Victorian Day!

"The event was a great success and it was lovely for the children to see how life has changed since that time. They all really enjoyed the Victorian games."

Local resident Bernie Hunt added: "We are really proud to have gained conservation status for the terraces and couldn't let the achievement go by without some sort of appropriate celebration.

"It was great to see everyone enjoying the day, especially the children learning about the history of the era."

Green light for new hospital

The redevelopment of the Royal Liverpool Hospital has been given the green light by planners.

Liverpool City Council has agreed outline plans to rebuild the hospital on land at the south east corner of its current site, at the junction of the planned Hall Lane bypass and West Derby Street.

And now the search is on for developers to draw up the detailed design of the building which the Royal bosses say will be a worldclass facility for the city.

Members of Liverpool's Planning Committee were told that there are a number of problems with the current hospital including its parking facilities, poor pedestrian links and a congested and unattractive entrance.

Refurbishment is not seen as a practical option because it would actually take longer and be more expensive than a new building.

The chosen site will allow the existing hospital to remain operational while construction work is in progress on the new complex.

Once the new building is complete

the old hospital will be demolished, but the Linda McCartney Centre, Education Centre and Dental Hospital will be retained.

The plans show that the new hospital will have around the same floor space as the existing building, but that it will have greater clinical space, making it feel more light and airy.

New roads will be built through the site, bringing people closer to the building, and public open space will be created, including an area for dropping off and picking up patients.

Project Director Helen Jackson commented: "Our vision is to create

a sustainable, world-class hospital on an attractive, accessible site."

If everything goes according to plan, work on rebuilding the Royal would start in 2011 and would be complete by 2015. It would then take a further three years to demolish the existing building and clear the site.

According to the plans, the Royal would also make £100,000 available towards the cost of creating a residents-only parking zone for the Kensington Fields neighbourhood.

Prestigious award for Kensington IN BRIEF Regeneration housing project

One of Kensington Regeneration's key projects has landed a prestigious Merseyside award.

The Tunnel Road housing development in Edge Hill has been honoured in the Liverpool Champion category of the 2008 Strictly Regeneration! Awards which celebrate the best projects supported by Housing Market Renewal and Neighbourhood Renewal funding.

The judges said that the Tunnel Road scheme – which will provide new homes for people from the nearby Central Edge Hill clearance area – demonstrates best practice in a number of ways:

"Partnership working between local residents and agencies as part of the Edge Hill Housing Focus Group ensured that local people were fully engaged in the design and development process.

"This meant that the delivery partners were fully aware of the local community's needs and aspirations.

"Kensington Regeneration funding was also used to subsidise the price of the new properties, enabling an increased number of local people to purchase a new home at a more affordable price.

"There was also close involvement with Bellway Homes throughout a pre-sale period which was agreed for local people facing clearance. Additional support from home advisors was also made available.

"Residents were also able to select homes that met their specific needs, including any necessary adaptations, and were able to choose their future neighbours," added the judges.

Kensington Regeneration Chief Executive, Lynn Spencer, said: "We're thrilled to win this award which is a tribute to the work of all the local residents involved in the Edge Hill Housing Focus Group.

"By coincidence, the Strictly

Regeneration! event was held on the same night as our own awards presentation so it was very nice to receive this honour while we were actually in the process of saluting our own community heroes."

Pauline Davis, who heads up Housing Market Renewal on Merseyside, added: "The awards are a wonderful way of rewarding all the excellent work that is going on in our area.

"We were very pleased with both

the quality and the quantity of the entries and would like to congratulate all the winners on their achievement."

A second Kensington Regeneration project was also highly commended in the Excellence in Design and Quality Category of the awards.

The judges were impressed with the environmental improvements to Cheviot Road, Middleton Road and Lindale Road which have helped to raise property prices in the area.

GOOD PROGRESS ON NEW HOMES DEVELOPMENTS

Good progress is being made on Kensington's two major new housing developments.

Residents can now see the new properties taking shape at Bellway's Joshua Place scheme on Tunnel Road in Edge Hill and at the Lovell development on Gilead Street.

Lynn Spencer, Chief Executive of Kensington Regeneration which has played a key role in both projects, commented: "It's good that the new homes at these two sites are now well advanced and that everyone in the area can see the progress that is being made.

"These superb developments will provide high-quality homes for local people and it will be fantastic to see families move in later in the year."

There are 43 homes in the first phase of the Joshua Place scheme. Eventually there will be 126 properties at the site, ranging from one-bedroom apartments to twobedroom bungalows and threebedroom family homes.

Meanwhile at Gilead Street 175 new homes are being created – 45 for rent, 24 for shared ownership and 106 for outright sale.

The first homes at both schemes are expected to be handed over in the summer.

NEW HATE CRIME HELPLINE

A new 24-hour hate crime helpline is now available in Kensington.

The Stop Hate Line, which takes callers directly through to independent charity Stop Hate UK, wants people to report incidents when they have been made to suffer because of their age, gender, race, religion, sexual orientation or disability.

The free and confidential service aims to raise awareness and understanding of hate crime, increase reporting of hate incidents, improve the quality of service

offered to residents who suffer hate crime and provide support to their communities.

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Edge Lane retailers in drive to win back lost business

Businesses on Edge Lane joined forces recently to mount a major marketing drive to attract customers back to the area.

For the past two years retailers and other local companies have been affected by an extensive programme of highway and infrastructure improvement works on the main eastern route into the city.

This caused traffic problems which made some customers reluctant to visit the area, unless strictly necessary. As a result, many businesses reported a significant drop in turnover.

However, with the road works and lane closures now at an end, companies are keen to win back the business they have lost.

Phil Linley of Business Liverpool, who co-ordinated the campaign, explained: "Although Edge Lane is now much improved, local businesses really suffered while the work was in progress.

"That's why we were able to obtain funding from Liverpool's Local Area

Agreement to mount a campaign telling people that Edge Lane is back to normal and that it's business as usual again for local companies.

"All the businesses in the area were invited to have their say on the format of the campaign which got under way in time for the important Easter trading period."

Companies involved in the initiative included the local stores of major national chains on Edge Lane Retail Park, smaller shops on Edge Lane itself and firms trading from units at Binns Road Industrial Estate.

The first phase of the campaign involved advertising on three local radio stations, press advertising and the distribution of a full-colour leaflet to 40,000 homes.

Phil Linley concluded: "Many people aren't aware of the wide variety of businesses in this area which is why we wanted to get the message across that there really is more to Edge Lane than meets the eye."

Laurence Mbombo from the Liverpool African Association said: "The day was a lot of fun and also very useful in terms of providing information about services available to women in Liverpool and giving people the chance to learn about different cultures from around the world."

The celebrations continued in the evening with an invitation-only awards event at which ten special women were honoured for their skills, personal qualities and hard work.

The winners were: Caring Woman – Mamie Davies; Young Woman –

Nicolette Muzazi; Special Woman – Fatima Sharif Ali; Community Matters – Zahra Sabbagh; Health – Mabel Longla; Entrepreneur – Ilham Hamood; Special Woman (50+) – Lilian Wake; Education – Denise Armstrong; Sports and Arts – Di Christian; Voluntary Sector and Community Work – Julia Walimbwa.

Laurence Mbombo added: "It was fantastic to have women of all ages and from different backgrounds celebrating together without any

barriers. It was a great event, attended by many people from Liverpool and from outside the city, with some coming from as far as France and Africa.

"Most of the women who won awards were really surprised and very touched. We will definitely stage the event next year and will be looking to link up with other organisations to make it bigger and even better."

TACKLING CARBON MONOXIDE

Hundreds of Kensington residents have been receiving protection against an invisible and silent killer.

Detectors have been installed in homes across the area to safeguard against leaks of carbon monoxide which can cause chronic illness and death. The installations were funded by Kensington Regeneration, whose Community Safety Task Group is concerned at the risks to vulnerable residents from faulty gas appliances.

The detectors were installed by Merseyside Fire Support Network volunteers and staff from Kensington

Regeneration, community wardens and local Councillors Louise Baldock and Wendy Simon.

Kensington Regeneration Board Member Pat Doyle commented: "We have become aware of some tragic incidents involving local people who have died as a result of carbon monoxide poisoning, and we want to make sure this does not happen again.

"There are many people, often in rented accommodation, relying on very old gas heaters and these are the people most at risk who we want to protect."

Warning signs to look for in your home include gas flames that are normally blue burning yellow or orange and sooty stains on or above appliances.

Symptoms of low-level poisoning include tiredness, dizziness, severe headaches and nausea.

Resident of the Year

Kensington's Resident of the Year for 2008 is Barbara Disley of Cheviot Road.

Barbara Disley collected the top honour at the 2008 Kensington Community Awards after receiving a clutch of nominations praising her work on the community garden at the end of Cheviot Road.

Described as a 'good neighbour who looks out for

everyone' Barbara was praised for working tirelessly to bring local residents together and

creating a community spirit in the area of which everyone can be proud. Activities in the garden have included a street party, an Easter egg hunt, a

summer feature including scarecrows and pixies and a special Christmas creation for The other local people shortlisted in the Resident of the Year category were Bernie

Culture Champion 2008 Award

The winners of the Culture Champion 2008 Award are George and Gosia McKane of the Yellow House arts project in Marmaduke Street.

Yellow House works with disaffected young people in Kensington, helping them to improve their lives and develop as individuals by taking part in a wide range of free arts activities including painting, theatre and film.

George and Gosia were nominated for this special award marking Liverpool's Capital of Culture year for running 'a brilliant youth theatre catering for young people usually ignored by the rest of society'.

The nomination also pointed out that the couple have 'done this for more than 20 years, despite all the struggles for funding'.

The other people shortlisted for this award were All Nations Cup organiser Siddi Majubah, for his work promoting cultural diversity and breaking down barriers between communities, and Steve Faragher and Wendy Miller for their work on the development of community radio

The Culture Champion 2008 Award was presented by sculptor Stephen Broadbent and sponsored by Kaleidoscope Advertising Design and Marketing.







Kensington's Black and Racial Minorities Volunteer of the Year is Ashton Gibiliru of Southbank Road.

Ashton was recognised for being 'friendly, hardworking and committed to Kensington'. For his 'day job' he works as a trainee coordinating the activities of Kensington United Community Football, but working as a volunteer he has also organised football tournaments as part of the 2008 Chinese New Year celebrations and the 2007 Kick

The nomination said that 'like his grandad, the much-loved Ghanian boxing champion Sugar Gibiliru, Ashton is a committed

The other finalists in this category were Yvonne Marufu, described as a 'very helpful and enthusiastic young woman' who played a key role in Kensington's International Women's Day celebrations in March this year, and Saul Marks, nominated for his work over the last three years on the regeneration of the historic Jewish cemetery on Deane Road.

The Black and Racial Minorities Volunteer of the Year trophy was presented by James Berry of Merseyside Fire and Rescue Service who sponsored the award.

Marie McDonald was recognised for her work in support of the regeneration of the Edge Hill area. She attends all the local meetings, and was closely involved with the project to provide residents with carbon monoxide alarms.

The nomination also praised the way she has helped friends and neighbours who are unwell and 'will drop everything to help them out'.

Marie was described as 'a supportive neighbour and a wonderful individual who

will always go that extra mile'. The other finalists in this category were Jim and Deborah Huthwaite of Holland Street.

This couple were recognised for the wide range of community activities they are involved in which include supporting Fairfield Residents' Association, tackling DIY-type jobs for neighbours and looking after refugees who are new to the area.

The Older Volunteer of the Year trophy was presented by Robin Baynes of New Start who sponsored the award.

Community **Learning Award**

The winner of the 2008 Community Learning Award is Barbara Galt of Cotswold Street in Kensington.

This category attracted a lot of entries this year with Barbara Galt being honoured both for her academic success and her commitment to give something back to the local community.

At the age of 65 Barbara graduated from Wirral Metropolitan College with a BA in Fine Arts after receiving support from the Kensington Community Bursary Project.

Since then, focusing on the theme that you're never too

Sophie was nominated for this award for being 'a dynamic, quirky, funny, friendly and beautiful young person' who is always on hand to welcome new members to Edge Hill Youth Club and to get involved in both serious and fun activities at the centre.

The nomination also stressed her significant contribution to a local community safety project and her support for the wider

Outstanding few months for KCLC

It's been a remarkable few months for Kensington Community Learning Centre and all the indications are that the best is yet to come.

After being selected as the North West's flagship UK Online Centre in the autumn, and then landing an important Government contract to raise awareness of the new NHS Choices website in the region, KCLC has just been shortlisted in the Outstanding Centre category of the prestigious UK Online Centres Awards.

In addition the case histories of two centre users - Roy Pearman and Andrew Hudson - have also been shortlisted in the Outstanding Achievement category of the awards so Kensington could potentially be a winner three times over!

Understandably, Centre Manager Alan Tapp is delighted with the latest news: "We would love to win this award, but as there are more than 6,000 Online Centres across the country just being selected as one of the five finalists is a fantastic achievement in itself.

"We'll be travelling down to the awards ceremony at the historic Globe Theatre in London on 24 June with our fingers crossed for KCLC and of course for Roy and Andrew as well. Whatever the outcome, it will be a great opportunity to fly the flag for Kensington at a major national event."

The Learning Centre's latest run of success began in October when it was honoured with flagship status as part of Get Online Day celebrations, an initiative to encourage people to take advantage

of all the positive benefits the Internet has to offer.

KCLC staff proved themselves more than worthy of this accolade - they got more people involved on the day than any other centre in the country!

They followed this success by winning the contract to promote the new NHS Choices website, a remarkable new resource featuring more than 80,000 pages of health-related information.

The Learning Centre's role is to 'teach the teachers' by recruiting other organisations from all over the North West and training them in the benefits of the site which they can then pass on to their clients and customers.

"The NHS site is the best Government site of its type I've ever seen," says Alan Tapp.

"It contains a fantastic amount of useful information and our job is

to get this message out across the region and to train organisations in how to get the best out of it."

As part of this training Alan will also be passing on some of the secrets of KCLC's success in engaging with local people.

When he arrived at the centre four years ago it was running four courses for just 15 people a week. Now it offers a range of around 30 courses which attract more than 250 students a week.

Understandably, other centres are keen to hear how this has been achieved and how they can follow in Kensington's footsteps.

"It's been a great few months for KCLC," says Alan Tapp. "The centre is now widely regarded as an example of best practice in our field and our job now is to maximise the benefits of this status for our clients and for Kensington as a whole."

CENTRE LANDS NHS CONTRACT

Kensington Community
Learning Centre has been
appointed by the Government

Choices website from Cheshire
up to the Scottish border.

However, Centre Manager Alan Tapp is quick to point out that this training is also available to groups and individuals in Kensington.

"Everyone can benefit from the wealth of information on the www.nhs.uk site which is presented in a logical and attractive way," he explains. "I would urge Kensington organisations and residents to get in touch with us and to arrange to come in and find out more about it."

The NHS Choices site is divided into three main areas. The **Live**Well section focuses on preventing ill health by looking at key topics such as diet, fitness, smoking, alcohol and drugs.

There are case histories of people affected by these issues, and tips on how to quit smoking, reduce your drinking and lose weight. The site also lists sources of local support for your postcode area, and provides information on how to obtain items such as nicotine patches and gum free of charge.

The second **Health A-Z** section currently features information on more than 700 conditions and this is expanding all the time.

Visitors to the site can find out more about everything from abscesses to yellow fever.

In each case NHS Choices explains the symptoms, what causes the condition, how it can be treated and how lifestyle changes can help to prevent it.

The third **Find Services** section enables site users to find out more about all the health services in their community. For example, they can find out which hospital offers a particular treatment and their track record in the procedure, the waiting time for treatment, how long they would be likely to spend in hospital and even comments from previous patients on the service they have received.

Add to all this a series of useful tools such as an interactive first aid kit and symptom checkers for conditions like asthma and diabetes, plus a section on sorting out the fact from the fiction in the health stories that appear in the newspapers, and it's clear that www.nhs.uk is an amazing resource for people of all ages.

"With a little bit of training we can really help people to get the best out of this site," says Alan Tapp. "Having said this, it's important to stress that we're not claiming to be health experts. Our job is to give people the information they need to make their own judgement on what's best for them."

Kensington Regeneration unveils new-look grants scheme

Kensington Regeneration is inviting applications from local groups for small grants from its new-look Community Fund project.

The Community Fund will provide up to 100 per cent of the cost of community-led projects and initiatives that can make a contribution towards achieving the aims of the New Deal programme.

In future, applications for funding will be accepted from community organisations and from social enterprises either based in Kensington NDC area, or based outside the area but working mainly with Kensington residents.

Grants of up to £5,000 will be available to:

- Community and voluntary organisations seeking to develop ideas or grow.
- Community and voluntary organisations looking to develop income-generating activities.

- Social enterprises seeking to develop or grow.
- Charitable organisations such as youth groups and play groups.
 Apart from a good idea, all that groups will need to apply for a grant is access to a bank account, a constitution or a set of rules.

There will be four stages to the application process

- 1. Groups will be able to register their interest in the Community Fund by completing and returning an initial enquiry form which will be available soon.
- 2. If the project is eligible for support the Community Fund Coordinator will contact you within a week of receiving the form to discuss the level of funding you might receive.
- **3.** The Fund Co-ordinator will then help you to develop the bestpossible full application.
- **4.** You application will then be considered by the grants panel

which will meet every two months and include community representatives, the Fund Co-ordinator and Community Development Officer, Maria Curran.

Kensington Regeneration will then provide further support to successful bids and help unsuccessful applicants to develop their applications further or signpost them in the direction of other sources of funds.

Local resident Alan Grace, who Chairs the Community Fund grants panel, commented: "Many community organisations and social enterprises are doing a great job in the Kensington NDC area. The Community Fund is designed to support this work and to help groups develop new activities that will contribute towards the regeneration of the area."

and to integrate that with the hopes and fears of the next young generation to increase awareness of Liverpool's history.


"It's been a really interesting project. I've learned a lot about Liverpool and about its people and the way they all link in together."

Youth Inclusion Project footballers head to Bosnia

Young footballers from Kensington Youth Inclusion Project recently jetted off to Bosnia to take part in a major football competition.

They were one of just three UK teams chosen to take part in Foãa 08, the first European street football festival organised by FIFA, which involved 12 European sides and 12 Balkan teams.

The players from the Nacromanaged Youth Inclusion Project were chosen because of their success in achieving football coaching qualifications, their voluntary work as community coaches and for helping to run an under-14 futsal (indoor five-a-side) tournament.

At the festival the YIP players offered to set up a football art workshop, organise futsal coaching sessions and assist medical staff as some of them are qualified in emergency aid.

Commenting ahead of the tournament, Paul Hurford, Nacro's Football Development worker in Kensington, said: "This is an amazing opportunity for our team, but it is well deserved. All of the players chosen to take part in Foãa 08 have put a lot of time and effort into developing themselves through football and futsal.

"The tournament will be an opportunity for us to demonstrate the work that we do and also to learn about other cultures, as well as some of the history of the Balkan region.

"Our players may be too young to remember the great Yugoslavian teams of the past, but they do know that Croatia beat England last year. And that's how football can help young people learn about the wider world."
