**Kensington's community heroes were honoured recently at a glittering gala dinner at the Devonshire House Hotel on Edge Lane.**

More than 150 guests attended the fourth Kensington Regeneration Community Awards presentation ceremony at which eight neighbourhood 'Oscars' were up for grabs.

They heard compere Dean Sullivan - alias Jimmy Corkhill from Brookside - describe the evening as 'a showcase to celebrate all the positive things that are happening in the local community'.

He added: "Tonight is about saying well done and thank you to individuals but it's also about saying well done to and thank you to a community that is working together to create a better Kensington."

The main award at the event - Kensington's 2007 Resident of the Year - went to Norma Lee who has worked tirelessly in support of the Edge Hill community for many years.

Other award winners ranged from nine-year-old Lesley Justin, who collected the Black and Minority Ethnic Award, to 83-year-old Evelyn Oldcorn from Fairfield who was honoured with the Good Neighbour Award.

Kensington Regeneration Chair Norma Williams, who was a guest speaker at the event, commented: "Many people in Kensington devote a lot of time and effort to helping others and the Community Awards are a way of recognising and saluting what they do.

"We had lots of entries this year and every single one of them demonstrated how kind-hearted individuals are improving the lives of people in their communities.

"The awards ceremony was a fantastic evening and I would like to congratulate everyone who was nominated as well as the winners. They're all heroes to me."

## TRIO LAND 'GREEN' JOBS

**Three unemployed young men from Kensington have landed full-time jobs with a company offering an innovative 'green' service to the building industry.**

Adam Hughes, Liam Harrison and Joey Phinnigan have joined Circle which provides a commercially viable way of recycling up to 90 per cent of construction waste that would normally be taken to landfill.

Circle stands for Construction Industry Recycling Centre for the Local Environment.

The men were taken on after completing a 12-week work placement with Liverpool City

Council's Transitional Employment Programme funded by Kensington Regeneration.

These placements are designed as a stepping stone back to work for jobless residents.

Commenting on his new role, 20-year-old Liam Harrison said: "Enrolling with the Transitional Employment Programme was one of the best moves I've ever made.

"Six months ago I wasn't working and I was in a bit of a rut. Now I've got this job which has really changed my life. I am earning a wage and have made some great new friends whilst doing something good for the

environment – and I don't even mind the early starts!"

George Allen, Kensington Regeneration's Lifelong Learning, Employment and Enterprise Manager, commented: "We have developed a number of joint Transitional Employment Programme projects with the council and this is another very good example of just how successful they can prove to be for local residents."

Circle is a joint venture between social housing providers the Riverside Group and the Plus Group and North West construction company the Seddon Group.

# Green light for Neighbourhood Centre

**Kensington's new £10-million neighbourhood centre at the corner of Beech Street and Prescott Road has been given the green light by planners.**

Liverpool City Council has formally approved the scheme and now work could start on site by the end of the year.

The landmark development on the former ice rink and bingo hall site will include shops and offices. 50 new

apartments on Prescott Road and nearby Lister Road are also part of the scheme.

In addition, the centre will incorporate a new fire station with community facilities to replace the area's ageing Low Hill premises.

Kensington Regeneration are investing in the scheme, but the majority of the funding will come from its development partner, CTP Limited. Other partners in the project include Liverpool City Council and Merseyside Fire and Rescue Service.

Commenting on the plans, Kensington Regeneration Chair Norma Williams said: "This scheme, which was developed after extensive consultation in the area, will transform a derelict site and create an exciting new focus for the neighbourhood.

"By improving the local environment, creating new jobs and enhancing local facilities it will


make a really positive statement about the future of Kensington."

Feedback from local people throughout the consultation has been overwhelmingly in favour of the scheme going ahead.

One resident told Kensington News: "I think the plans are great. As well as providing a range of new facilities the project will smarten up a key junction used by thousands of motorists every day, helping to improve the image of Kensington as a whole."

Another local person commented: "This site has been a wasted opportunity for years so it's good news that a redevelopment scheme is finally getting under way."

## LIVERPOOL ON THE UP SAYS COUNCIL LEADER

**Liverpool's confidence is growing and its view of itself is changing, City Council Chief Executive Colin Hilton told a meeting of business leaders in Kensington recently.**

Mr Hilton said that progress on numerous major projects such as King's Dock, Liverpool One in Paradise Street and the new Pier Head museum have helped to create an exciting new atmosphere in the city.

He said: "The negativity that has

been felt in the past is going. There is massive investment by the private sector as well as the public agencies and confidence is growing. Liverpool now has a huge opportunity to position itself once again as a major international city."

Mr Hilton was speaking to a gathering of around 50 people, hosted by Gardner Systems at Wavertree Technology Park and organised by Business Liverpool and the Business Leaders Group in the Kensington Regeneration area.

## Exhibition focuses on the experiences of asylum seekers

**A unique exhibition has given people in Kensington the opportunity to experience the difficulties of life as an asylum seeker.**

Local residents and children at the Academy of St Francis of Assisi had the opportunity to visit Escape to Safety, a series of interactive rooms in a 40-foot trailer, showing the various stages of an asylum seeker's journey from danger to safety in another country.

The exhibition was funded by City Safe and organised by Refugee Action, Kensington Regeneration and Time Together at Asylum Link.

Visitors to the exhibition were given discount vouchers to the highly-acclaimed production of Kindertransport at the Liverpool Playhouse Theatre. This play focuses on the arrival of young Jewish refugees from Germany before the Second World War.

An exhibition of artwork produced by young people based on their perceptions of asylum seekers before and after they visited the trailer was also on display at the Playhouse.

## BIG CROWDS EXPECTED AT FESTIVAL

**More than 1,000 people are expected to attend the first Edge Hill International Festival on Saturday, June 9th.**

The event, which has been called Truck Stop, will be held at Edge Hill railway station on the approach to platforms three and four and will feature local, national and international talent. Award-winning

scriptwriter Jimmy McGovern will launch the festival, which has been organised by Metal Liverpool in conjunction with a group of local residents called Creative Edge.

It is one of a number of events being organised in relation to Edge Hill station. Activities on the day will include Victorian games, film screenings, poetry sessions, dancing,

portrait painting and live action drawing, car painting, Kensington FM radio, a speakers' corner, walking tours, kids workshops, performances, food and much more.

Ceri Hand, Director of Metal, said: "This will be a fantastic day with activities for all the family. It will be the first public event at the historic landmark site of Edge Hill station

and a taster for a bumper festival during 2008."

Buildings at the station are going to be developed into an arts centre, to be launched in April 2008, so organisers are hoping to stage an even bigger festival next year.

The event takes place from 10am until 6pm and Jimmy McGovern will say a few words at 12 noon.

# NEWS IN BRIEF

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**Top apprentice**

Kensington trainee plasterer Danielle McGivern has been honoured as the best apprentice in the national Women in Construction Awards. Danielle scored the highest marks ever recorded on her training course run by Fusion 21. She has now found work with Bramall Construction.

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**Sweet success**

Sweet firm Tangerine, which has a factory on Edge Lane, recently celebrated the end of a successful first year since it was bought out by its new management team. Thanks to new products and acquisitions sales topped the £60-million mark, making Tangerine the UK's largest independent confectionery company.

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**Free detectors**

Up to 500 homes in Fairfield are to receive free carbon monoxide detectors. Kensington Regeneration has joined forces with Merseyside Fire Service to launch the scheme which, if successful, could be extended to other parts of the New Deal area.

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**Notable award**

A Kensington music project has been honoured in a top regeneration awards scheme. Music for Life - a partnership between the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra, Kensington Regeneration and local primary schools - was recognised as an example of best practice by Renew Northwest, the regional centre of excellence in regeneration.

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**Caribbean event**

The United Colours of Kensington recently organised a successful Caribbean cultural evening at the Caribbean Centre in Toxteth. The event included a steel band workshop, limbo dancing displays, carnival costumes, readings from Caribbean literature, Caribbean food and face painting for younger guests.

This was the third in a series of celebration evenings and followed similar events focusing on Indian and Yemeni cultures.

A grant of £22,000 was awarded to the nursery to improve an outside play area and to provide a soft surface and shelter that can be used at all times.

The funding has also gone towards the provision of a secure buggy park to improve health and safety.

Dennis Hardiman, Head of St. Sebastian's School and a member of the nursery's management team, said: "The whole idea of the buggy park is to encourage people to walk

with their buggies and not to drive. It's also about improving safety so that people aren't tripping over them all the time.

"I would like to pay tribute to Sue Jeffcoate who sadly died recently. She was instrumental in making the Field of Dreams what it is today and in effect making the dream a reality. She made the new play area and buggy park happen and was involved in many different initiatives at St. Sebastian's and other schools in Kensington."

Work on the play area will be completed soon when the sheltered area and landscaping work is finished.

Sgt Simon Joyce of the Kensington Police Team commented: "We are delighted to have these extra resources for the area. The CSOs will be a frequent presence on the

streets and will help communication between us and local people."

The new CSOs will work in Kensington, Clubmoor, Fairfield and Tuebrook.

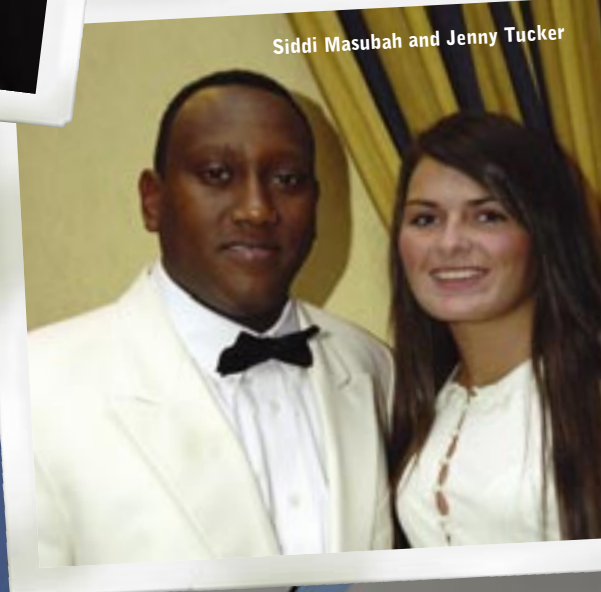

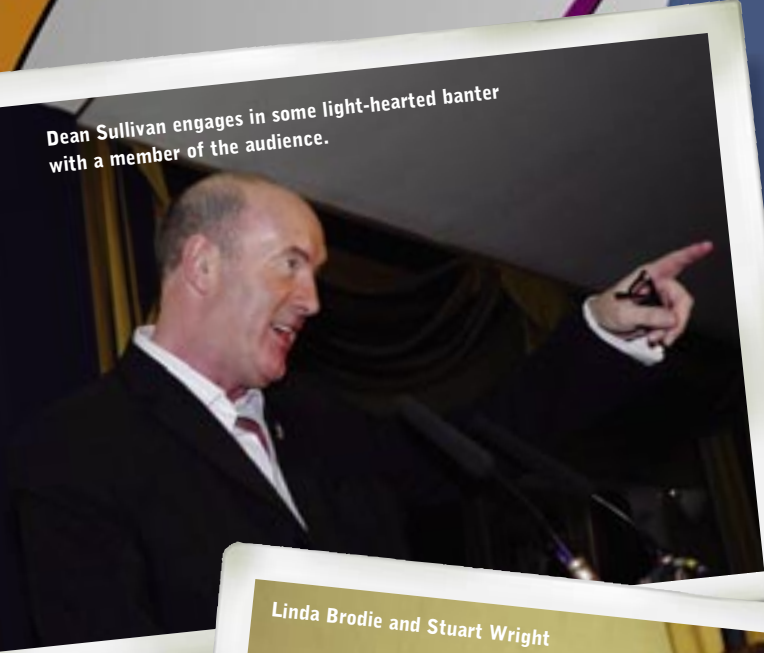

More than 150 people attended the glittering event in the Marquee Suite of the Devonshire House Hotel on Edge Lane.

Looking back at the 2007 awards, Lynn Spencer said: "We had a bumper entry this year and, as ever, choosing a winner in each category was an exceptionally difficult job."

"However, the eight award winners add up to a remarkable roll of honour that reflects just how strong the community spirit is here in Kensington."

"As for the awards evening itself all the feedback we've had has been excellent so now we've got another difficult job - making it even bigger and better for 2008."

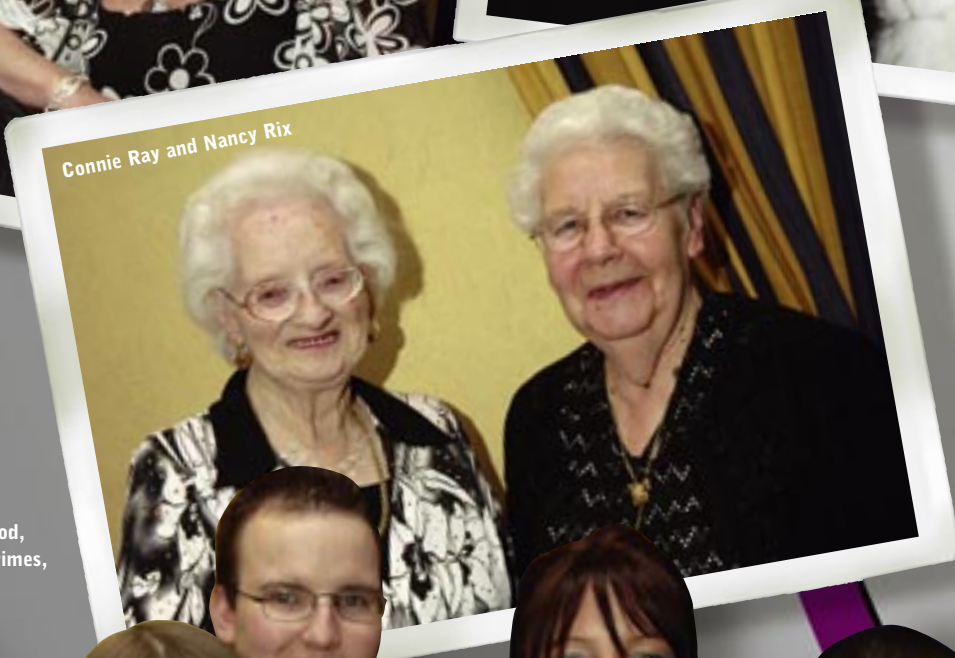

Here are the remarkable stories of the individuals honoured in the 2007 Kensington Regeneration Community Awards:

## Good Neighbour Award

### Evelyn Oldcorn

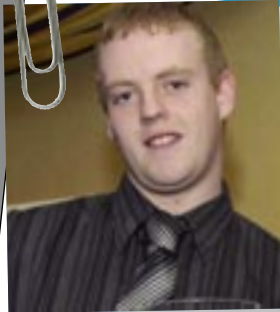
The winner of the Good Neighbour Award was Evelyn Oldcorn of Rawlins Street in Fairfield.

Describing her as an 'exceptional' person the neighbour who nominated her said: "Evelyn, who is 83 years old and not in good health, is always on hand to help her neighbours. She has been a volunteer at the Thursday Club at St John's Community Centre for over 30 years, helping out with dinners for the pensioners and the social club. "She is always there to help neighbours who are housebound with shopping, calling on them every day to make sure they are all right."

The other finalists were Laura Cooper of Romulus Street, whose neighbour said she didn't know what she would do without her, and Irene Power of Gannock Street, described in her nomination as 'a neighbour in a million'.



## Young Citizen Award



### Mark Corrigan

The winner of the Young Citizen Award was Mark Corrigan of Greesley Close who received a clutch of nominations for his work at Edge Hill Youth Club.

One nomination said: "He always has time for others and is always the first to offer help whenever you need it."

Another described Mark as: "Honest and trustworthy - an excellent role model. He never asks for anything himself and puts others first. He has a good rapport with young people and a sense of humour that young people can relate to."

The other finalists in this category included Steven McDonald of Hughes Close who was described as 'a special young man who makes Kensington a happier place' and Lee Grimes of Greesley Close, praised for helping young people to overcome problems linked to bullying. Jake Evason, a pupil at Sacred Heart Catholic Primary School, was also recognised for his work with the School Council of which he is currently the Chair. The fifth finalist, Liam Hussey, was recognised for his work as Chair of EAGERS. One nomination said that he is 'an excellent example of a young person who has displayed a commitment to the community.'



## Heart of Gold Award

### Shelagh Hale

This year's Heart of Gold Award went to 79-year-old Shelagh Hale of Beech Street.

Shelagh was praised for her work at St John's Community Centre and for the help she provides to individual friends and neighbours.

# EDGE LANE PROJECT UPDATE

**Good progress is being made with many elements of the Edge Lane Project which is being implemented by Liverpool Land Development Company and its partners.**

As this newsletter went to press contractors were putting the finishing touches to the improvements on Edge Lane Drive and work on upgrading Edge Lane Central - from Rathbone Road to Botanic Road - remains on target for completion in late summer.

The work in this area includes highway resurfacing, new kerbs and paving, junction improvements, improved pedestrian crossing facilities, new feature lighting and tree planting.

A new junction is also being created to provide access to the new business park that will be built on the former MTL bus depot site.

This new development - on which infrastructure work is now under

way - is aimed at high-tech companies and could eventually attract more than 1,000 jobs to the area from businesses in the technology, ICT, digital and creative sectors.

Nearby, developers Urban Splash are finalising details of their redevelopment of the former Littlewoods/JCM building.

The company is set to transform the landmark building into apartments, commercial space and a hotel and will be submitting a planning application to Liverpool City Council shortly.

Meanwhile, a second Compulsory Purchase Order (CPO) is expected to be made in the near future in the Edge Lane West area.

This will aim to bring 370 mostly empty and derelict properties on 24 acres of land into public ownership to enable regeneration work to get under way.

Many local people who want this work to start as soon as possible

were disappointed when the High Court quashed the first CPO last November due to an error in the way it had been processed.

Liverpool Land Development Company Chief Executive, Ian Hassall, said: "We know the plans for Edge Lane West are supported by the great majority of the local community.

"They helped to develop the proposals and will see major change for the better when the work takes place."

# JOB SCHEME WINS AWARD

**An initiative which found construction jobs on the Edge Lane Project for five Kensington residents has won a national award.**

The five men had been long-term unemployed before being helped by JET Eastern Link and Kensington Regeneration to secure training and jobs with Alfred McAlpine on the improvement works which are being co-ordinated by Liverpool Land Development Company.

A year after they started work, the five have been declared national winners in Alfred McAlpine's Corporate Responsibility Awards and have collected a prize of £1,000 plus £1,000 for a charity of their choice.

The men - who were trained as dumper truck drivers - are Mick Kewley, Ian Stokes, Steve Morgan, Tommy McGregor and George Hart.

Steve Morgan said: "If it wasn't for the training and the help in

getting the qualifications, we wouldn't have got these jobs. Now we've got both the skills and the experience which means that after the Edge Lane Project, we'll have a good chance of finding more construction work."

Alfred McAlpine's Edge Lane Project Manager Julian Wilson said: "It was great to get the award for our commitment to local recruitment but it is all down to the work of the men - they deserve it."

# Gearing up for major new improvements in the area

**G.E.A.R.S, one of the most active residents' associations in Kensington, has made a major contribution to the area since it was formed six years ago.**

The association was set up by local people after concerns were raised about the amount of anti-social behaviour, litter and fly tipping in its operating area which is focused on nine roads in Fairfield.

The group was originally set up as a Home Watch in 2000 but it soon became clear that the residents wanted to do a lot more than just keep an eye on each other's homes.

That's when the G.E.A.R.S Residents' Association came into being and since then meetings have been held on a monthly or six-weekly basis and regular newsletters are issued. The group has never been a 'talking shop' and strongly believes that the association has to take action to make a difference to people's lives.

At the beginning members focused on the issue of litter and fly

tipping as this was the key problem for local people, particularly around the back entries where it resulted in other hazards including rats and fires.

A clean-up was organised through the City Council's community skips programme and residents of all ages turned out in force with brushes and bin bags to give the area a facelift.

Patience Jones, the association's Vice Chair, said: "As an organisation we always take part in events when we are invited and we regularly have a stand at the Kensington Fun Day.

"We have good links with the police, the community wardens, Kensington Regeneration, Community Seven and Christine Flood and the Clean Team and always keep on top of local problems."

Although the association has achieved a great deal, anti-social behaviour unfortunately remains a problem and is on the agenda of almost every meeting.

Members work closely with the community wardens and the police to address the problem and many positive activities have been organised for the young people including street parties, Christmas parties, mural painting, flower planting and trips out to attractions including Gulliver's World, Deeside Ice Rink, Blackpool lights and Chester Zoo.

Members of the G.E.A.R.S committee were so keen to engage the local children in its activities that it was suggested that they should be asked their views. And so E.A.G.E.R.S, a junior group, was formed 18 months ago (see panel).

Ann Rodgers, Secretary of the association for the last three years, said: " We now have so much going on. The area is a lot better for it and there is far less anti-social behaviour. Personally I have found the experience great. I'm doing things I never did before like face painting and mosaic work. It's given me a lot more confidence."

## Eager to make a difference

**E.A.G.E.R.S was formed 18 months ago to give young people in the area a say on what goes on within the main G.E.A.R.S association.**

Members also attend the regular meeting where they have a slot on the agenda to update older members on the various activities they are organising.

16-year-old Liam Hussey has taken on the role of Chair of the group, which has the slogan 'always eager to make a difference.'

The group has already been involved in a number of community activities including a clean-up of Birchfield Community Park.

E.A.G.E.R.S also received a grant of £1,900 from Kensington Regeneration's New Communities

Fund to pay for a range of activities including trips to Camelot and Gulliver's World, paintballing and ice skating, which were attended by 70 children and parents.

Liam commented: "We want to organise a lot of trips this summer and, looking ahead to 2008, we want to arrange something really special for Capital of Culture year."

Shaun Rodgers, E.A.G.E.R.S Support Officer, added "Since the junior group was formed crime has dropped by 20 per cent. I'd like to stick my neck out and say that kids are actually stopping others causing trouble. If they see kids smashing a window, for example, they now report it. In my view that's really, really good."

G.E.A.R.S is an acronym of the streets the association was formed to support - Gresham Street, Garthowen Road, Eltham Street, Edge Grove, Edge Lane, Adamson Street, Alford Street, Romulus Street and South Bank Road. There are more than 200 properties on these roads.

## PENNY BENCH

**One of the most successful projects G.E.A.R.S has been involved with is the Penny Bench, which now has pride of place in Birchfield Park.**

The association was awarded £48,000 from the Heritage Lottery Fund for the project and the bench was the result of more than 14 months of work by members and arts organisation Safe Productions.

The bench features a host of memories of Birchfield School – which used to occupy the site – as well as reflections on growing up in Kensington and the social history of Fairfield.

The spectacular mosaic sculpture was created with the help of residents and local schoolchildren who took part in a series of workshops.
