Work begins on Edge Hill redevelopment programme

Plans for a major redevelopment programme in Edge Hill have taken an important step forward.

Work has begun on the first phase of the demolition of older terraced properties in the area as part of Merseyside's NewHeartlands Housing Market Renewal programme.

These houses will be replaced with 300 brand new family homes with gardens, safe routes to schools, green streets to local parks, a community hub and space for shops and businesses.

Local residents who have been displaced by the programme were given first option on new housing developments in the area at Tunnel Road, Gilead Street and Lomond Road.

Norma Lee, Chair of the Edge Hill Housing and Issues Focus Group, and Norma Williams, Chair of Kensington Regeneration, have both worked tirelessly to represent the views of local people in recent years.

Norma Lee commented: "We realised that drastic changes were necessary in the area, and this is the real beginning of them. The start of demolition has taken us one step closer to it all becoming a reality.

"I have lived in Edge Hill all my life and in my present home for the last 49 years. Leaving it will be a very emotional time, but I am looking forward to making a new start. It's been a long process, but it will

Marilyn Fielding, Liverpool City Council Executive Member for Safer, Stronger Communities and a NewHeartlands Board Member, said: "We are delighted that the transformation of Edge Hill is now becoming a reality.

"To get to this stage a lot of hard work has been done by Liverpool City Council, by Kensington Regeneration, by the Housing Market Renewal team, by residents and by other partners.

"By continuing to pull together we can build on the existing strengths of this community to make it a fantastic place to live," added Councillor Fielding.

MINISTER'S FACT-FINDING VISIT TO NEW DEAL AREA

A leading Government Minister recently made a fact-finding visit to Kensington.

Baroness Andrews, Under
Secretary of State for Communities
and Local Government, was the guest
of Kensington Regeneration as she
visited a number of local facilities

Learning Centre, the Life Bank,

Other ports of call included Kensington Community Sports Centre and the new housing development at Gilead Street.

At the Learning Centre the Minister was told that more than 2,500 students have registered with the facility - including 950 from black and ethnic minority backgrounds - and that they have gained a total of 2,000 qualifications.

Baroness Andrews said: "This

must be one of the proudest success stories for Kensington Regeneration, with local people receiving free training and hundreds going into further training or into jobs as a result.

"This New Deal for Communities initiative has had a very real impact on the local community and this centre is just one of the projects that will form Kensington Regeneration's legacy, long into the future."

New welcome pack for refugees and asylum seekers

A new welcome pack is now available for refugees and asylum seekers who want to live in Kensington.

Kensington Regeneration recently launched the publication which is based on research into the needs of black and ethnic minority residents and is available in nine languages.

The pack includes a wide range of useful information including sections on jobs and training, education, finance, housing, health, crime prevention and keeping safe, fire safety, transport and local authority and community services.

The new pack has been welcomed by local resident Aime-Claude Ndongozi who came to Liverpool eight years ago from war-torn Rwanda with just ten pounds in his pocket and no idea

where to turn for hel

Aime-Claude, who now runs a consultancy dealing with asylum issues, said: "When I arrived in Kensington I felt really isolated. Not having any information was a big problem and it is especially hard for people who cannot speak English.

"Everything is very different from countries such as Rwanda but this pack explains how everything is done here, which is exactly what is needed."

Kensington Regeneration Board Member, John Caton, commented: "Most of us don't realise the practical difficulties facing people arriving in this country.

"I am delighted that we are now able to offer some real support to help individuals and families settle in Kensington as easily as possible."

Kensington Regeneration recently organised the most successful jobs fair in its eight-year history.


Around 250 local residents attended the event to find out more about vacancies in city centre shops, construction, seafaring, security, the NHS and other sectors.

THE BIG INTERVIEW -

Right royal plans for city's new hospital

As a three-month period of consultation on a new city hospital for Liverpool continues, Kensington News talks about the current proposals to Tony Bell, Chief Executive of the Royal Liverpool and Broadgreen University Hospitals NHS Trust.

Few subjects generate such a passionate response as healthcare changes, so it's hardly surprising that there is huge interest in the current proposals to create a new Royal Liverpool Hospital for the 21st century.

For this reason when Kensington News met Tony Bell, the man who heads up the project that could eventually cost close to £500 million, he was keen to share his excitement about the future of the Royal.



Change is in the air for the Royal.

"Our new hospital is going to be stunning," said Tony."We have the opportunity to design a building in which all patients will be in single rooms and in which we will provide treatment with the latest technology.

LANDMARK

"It will make a huge difference to the morale of both patients and staff and it will also be a landmark we can be proud of on the doorstep of the city centre and Kensington."

The Royal Liverpool and Broadgreen University Hospitals NHS Trust is proposing to build the new hospital on part of its existing site, at the junction of the planned Hall Lane bypass and West Derby Street.

The possibility of refurbishing the current hospital was rejected after studies found that it would be much more expensive and take far longer - and the end result would not be much different.

When the new hospital is completed, hopefully by 2015, the

old buildings will be demolished and parkland established in its place, with the possibility of limited health-related development along the Prescot Street end of the site. The Linda McCartney Centre and the Dental Hospital will remain.

The new building will be more accessible, spacious and flexible, with larger clinical areas and corridors, while all patient beds will be in single rooms with ensuite facilities.

"This is important because research shows that people recover more quickly in single rooms," says Tony Bell. "This is because it makes the whole hospital experience less stressful and more comfortable.

"It will also help to reduce hospital infections because it is more difficult for them to spread," adds the Royal boss.

Wards will have their own shared education facilities, rooms for private meetings with patients and relatives and more storage space.


CONSULTATION

Tony Bell continues: "We're currently involved in an extensive consultation exercise about how we plan to improve the services we provide and also how the new hospital fits in with wider changes in health services in Liverpool.

"It is Liverpool Primary Care Trust who are leading the consultation, because a new Royal is part of their overall plans to improve the city's health service."

Up to £100 million is being invested by Liverpool PCT in new and improved community health facilities, more staff and an expansion of community-based health care. This will enable more services to be delivered closer to people's homes and ensure that services continue to meet the needs of the city.

The plan also involves further development of Broadgreen



A series of public meetings has taken place and thousands of letters and information documents have been distributed to generate interest and feedback about the proposals. The public consultation comes to an end on October 20th and the results will then be evaluated by Liverpool PCT.

"For people living in Kensington, our new hospital will have a huge impact. It will look so much better, it will have landscaped grounds to walk through, and it will tie in with the massive regeneration programme going on in the area," says the Royal chief.

OPPORTUNITIES

"Also, the building work will involve recruiting lots of people and we will make sure our contractors target local people with the job opportunities.

"This is something we already do, as we have a very successful partnership with Kensington Regeneration and JET. We have around 5,000 staff which means there are regularly vacancies in all areas, not just patient care but also in support functions such as admin and IT."

Tony Bell continues: "Our aim is to provide services which are equal to the best in the world, in a hospital built to world-class standards.

"We have consulted closely with our clinicians and with staff in all areas to make sure we get the plans right. And now we are asking patients and local people what they think. This isn't a cosmetic consultation exercise - we really want to involve as many people as possible in making the most of this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

OUTSTANDING

"At the end of the day our key objective is to provide outstanding care for our patients, and we believe this option will create the new hospital that local people deserve."

After the project is approved by Liverpool PCT and by the Strategic Health Authority, the tendering and design process will take at least until 2010.

If work then begins on site in 2011, the new hospital could open its doors some time in late 2015.

"It will be a massive project, and a long one," says Tony Bell. "However, the benefits for the city when it is complete will be enormous."


Bearing fruit
